

SYNOPSIS

Two years have passed since Indigenous Australians have been granted citizenship and voting rights. Molly Chubb moves from the big smoke back to the small country town of her birth at a time of great political change.

The rodeo has come to town, along with a kombi van of hippies and a cavalcade of noisy politicians sweating in their suits on the 1969 Federal election trail, exposing old and new attitudes to the changing face of Australia.

Panawathi Girl ('Dream Girl' in Milroy's mother's Palyku language) marks the His Majesty's Theatre debut for Yirra Yaakin Theatre Company, whose recent Perth Festival appearances have included the acclaimed productions *The Sum of Us* and the all-Noongar-language Shakespeare re-telling of *Macbeth*, *Hecate*.

WRITER CRISS

I became interested in writing *Panawathi Girl* after reading an old newspaper advertisement for a Rodeo Ball. In the ad was the line "Coloured girls are welcome", implying that certain people were not welcome.


I've set *Panawathi Girl* in 1969 when the safari suit and groovy jingles heralded a new era of Australian political campaigning. Optimism and a desire for change was rife in 1969 and 1972 as the 'It's Time' jingle flooded across Australian televisions and radios.

Fifty years on it is difficult to maintain the same optimism with the dismal findings of the Closing the Gap reports and the lack of acknowledgement of the true colonial history of Australia and the ever-present issue of Aboriginal sovereignty.

I am honoured to have been able to realise this work with such a talented West Australian cast and crew. The support from Yirra Yaakin has been immense. I asked for a band that could play a variety of instruments and styles with the grit that comes from playing the smallest pub to the biggest stage. My wish was granted and we have an amazing band of musicians led by Wayne Freer.







I'd like to make special mention of my daughter Aria who sang when she was born and therefore the name. Aria's song 'Shadow in the Dark' was composed on her ukulele when she was ten-years-old and features in *Panawathi Girl*. I'd like to leave you with one of the most wonderful and thought provoking lines from her song:

Difference is better than immortality.

DAVID MILROY


Writer

David is one of Australia's leading Aboriginal playwrights, dramaturgs and directors. A multi-award-winning artist, David's work has toured successfully across Australia and the world. Born in Perth in 1957, his family links are with the Yindjibarndi and Palku people of the Pilbara.

David was a founding member of AbMusic, formed in 1986 to support and nurture Aboriginal musicians in Western Australia and was the first Artistic Director of Yirra Yaakin Theatre Company from 1995 – 2003. David's writing and directing credits include Waltzing the Wilarra, Windmill Baby, King Hit, Runumuk and Sally Morgan's







Cruel Wild Woman. His recent works
Rodeo Moon, Crowbones and Carnivores,
Swine River and Killer Kane have been
presented at WAAPA.

David's music has featured in films

Blackfellas and Exile and the Kingdom.

In Waltzing the Wilarra, Aliwa, Solid,

Windmill Baby, King Hit, Alice, Sally Morgan's

Cruel Wild Woman for Yirra Yaakin, Sistergirl

and Dead Heart for Black Swan Theatre

Company and Perth Theatre Company's

production of Wild Cat Falling he provided

the musical direction.

David received two Equity Guild Awards in 2011 for his play *Waltzing the Wilarra*. His play *Windmill Baby* made history in 2005 by being the first ever single script to win the prestigious Patrick White Award. David received a Sidney Myer Award in 2002 for his contribution to the development of Indigenous theatre.

EVA GRACE MULLALEY

Director

Eva is a Widi woman from the Yamatji Nation in the Midwest region of Western Australia. She graduated from the Certificate IV in Aboriginal Theatre Course at the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts (WAAPA) in 2003 and began her directing career in 2005 as an assistant to David Milroy for the first creative development of *Windmill Baby*, produced by Yirra Yaakin Theatre Company.

In her more than 18-year career Eva has worn many hats in the theatre industry including director, arts administrator, stage manager, tour manager – internationally and nationally – producer, event manager, actor,







dramaturg, lecturer in Character and Script Analysis, collaborating director, workshops coordinator and many more. She has worked as a director and dramaturg for Moogahlin Performing Arts, Yellamundie Indigenous Playwrights Festival, ILBIJERRI Theatre Company, Te Rēhia Theatre Company, WAAPA and YIRRAMBOI Festival. Eva was also working as the development producer for the Australian Blackfulla Performing Arts Alliance (BPAA), a national peak body for Indigenous theatre and performers.

She is currently artistic director of Yirra Yaakin Theatre Company in Perth, Western Australia.









ADAM EDWARDS

Assistant Director

Adam studied and completed the Aboriginal Theatre Acting course acting at WAAPA, and went on to further his studies at the Sydney Actors School. He is currently studying at International Screen Academy doing a full time two and a half year acting for screen course in Sydney. Adam has been involved in numerous stage productions and one short film at WAAPA.









SALLY RICHARDSON

Dramaturg

Sally is the Director of Steamworks Arts. An Australian director, writer, dramaturg, arts consultant and producer working across the performing arts, she is passionately committed to the creation of new Australian work and developing collaborations with other artists in the region with a focus on contemporary theatre, dance and performance. Sally has been commissioned and has created and directed for a range of companies and organisations from intimate boutique works, through to new circus, puppetry and film projects, in addition to facilitating large scale community events and programs.

JANINE OXENHAM


Choreographer

BRUCE MCKINVEN


Set Designer

Lighting Designer



Lucy's distinctive approach to depth, contrast and beauty within her designs make her an identifiable theatre artist.










LYNN FERGUSON

QI CAO


Dresser



Performer

CHRIS ISAACS


Performer


ANGELICA LOCKYER


NADIA MARTICH

She began her professional dance training at NAISDA Dance College (National Aboriginal Islander Skills Development Association) and studied at WAAPA before participating in the Indigenous Dance residency in Banff, Canada in 2016 and touring Hawaii with Wagana Aboriginal Dancers in 2017. She has performed with Ochre Contemporary Dance Company, Karul Projects and in Yirra Yaakin's children's theatre show *Bilya Kaatijin*.









LILA MCGUIRE

Performer

Lila is a Whadjuk and Wardarndi Noongar woman who from a young age has had a keen interest in acting and singing. In 2020 she began pursuing her dream of becoming a performer with the Aboriginal Performance course at WAAPA. In 2021 she performed at the NAIDOC Awards and she sang at the 2020 Kambarang Festival with Della Mob. She was assistant producer for Kalyakoorl Collective's show *Fire* and is in her second year of a Bachelor of Acting at WAAPA.









GUS NOAKES

Performer

Originally from Sydney, Gus travelled to Perth in 2019 to attend WAAPA, graduating in 2021. An avid and self-taught musician, Gus frequently gigs at many of Perth's music venues, the most iconic being his residency at The Old Synagogue in Fremantle where he has been the 'Piano Man' since late 2019. Gus also released his debut single 'Better' in August 2021 under his stage name "Noakesy", followed by his second single 'Fashion' in November. Gus makes his professional theatrical debut with Panawathi Girl.










TERESA ROSE

Maitland is one of WA's premier Indigenous contemporary theatre artists. He cofounded the international theatre company Corazon de Vaca and has performed in and co-created a number of their productions, both in Spain and Australia. He has worked with many independent theatre companies in Perth, performing in productions for Yirra Yaakin (Hecate, Conversations with the Dead, King Hit), Black Swan State Theatre Company, Queensland Theatre Company and Griffin Theatre. Maitland works with artists from various backgrounds and is a member of Wadumbah Noongar Dance Group.










MANUAO TEAOTONGA

Performer

Manuao has been performing for over 30 years around Australia, New Zealand and the UK in productions such as Rocky Horror Picture Show (Frank n Furter), Sweeney Todd (Pirelli), The Addams Family and many more. Five times nominated for a Finley award he won best male musical theatre performer in 2019 for his role as Simon/Lola in Kinky Boots. Also a makeup artist and lecturer, Manuao designed makeup for The Addams Family, Cinderella and The Little Mermaid in 2021 and Wizard of Oz in 2022.









WIMIYA WOODLEY

Performer

Wimiya grew up in Roebourne, in Western Australia's Pilbara region. His name means 'emu' in the Indigenous language spoken by the Warralong community. Ever since he was young, Wimiya liked to be creative and had an interest in the arts. He moved to Perth to study at WAAPA where he co-created the self-devised work *Even Hands* and created and featured in a short film, *Nyinkara*. The full-length version of this six-minute film is currently in post-production. *Panawathi Girl* is his first production with Yirra Yaakin.

Musician

Ric Eastman can be heard on recordings by artists such as Hank Marvin, Dave Hole, John Meyer, Guy Ghouse and Gina Williams. He has toured nationally and internationally with artists such as Demis Roussoss, The Supremes, Natalie Gillespie and The Zydecats and has recorded with artists such as Ian Moss, Tex Perkins and Tim Rogers, Ben Lee, Jack Jones and numerous soundtracks and jingles. Ric has performed with the Western Australian Symphony Orchestra, Perth Symphony Orchestra, Adelaide Symphony Orchestra and the Sydney Symphony Orchestra.









ADAM GARE

Musician

Adam is a multi-instrumentalist musician based in Perth. Since the 1980s his renowned skills as a mandolinist, violinist and vocalist have led to his collaboration with numerous bands and he has won two West Australian Music Industry awards for song writing and Most Outstanding Male Vocals. He moved to Melbourne for 12 years performing and touring extensively with various artists including singer/songwriter Paul Kelly. Adam's theatre credits include Romeo and Juliet at the Melbourne Botanical gardens, Melbourne Theatre Company's Grapes of Wrath and, most recently, Black Swan's Oklahoma.









LUCKY OCEANS

Musician

Lucky is a Grammy Award-winning pedal steel guitarist who became a central figure in Australian cultural life as presenter of the Daily Planet on Radio National for 21 years. Lucky has played with Willie Nelson, Eric Clapton, Emmylou Harris, Merle Haggard and Jerry Lee Lewis. He writes music for theatre, film and TV and he presented the ABC TV Series *The Planet*. His 2019 album *Purple Sky*, featuring Paul Kelly and Kasey Chambers, was nominated for an ARIA award.

YIRRA YAAKIN THEATRE COMPANY



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
